

#### **BIG THANKS**

I want to let everyone know, that doesn't already know, Marsha Barnes has been preparing the Egg Salad Sandwiches for the last several months. That has been a major help to me and I wish to say "Thanks MARSH"!!!

President's message -- First of all, we had a great crowd for January with about 40 in attendance. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the officers who served our Club last year; especially Jack Parrish for the fine job as news editor and secretary. Thanks, Jack, for a job well done.

Nick Cook was our featured demonstrator at the January meeting. Nick started his demonstration by showing the uses of the skew chisel, which many of us have tried & probably given up on. He showed how to cut beads and coves with the skew & demonstrated different cuts to illustrate its versatility - when he finished, he had a garden dibble. He then proceeded to turn a table leg and let the members design the form. With one finished, he then duplicated that leg, to get a matching pair. (Congratulations to Glen for winning the two legs in the raffle - we'll all be awaiting Glen's design of a two-legged stool!). Nick then went on to turn two spindles for gluing in brushes (a basting brush and duster). Honey dipper was next.

After the lunch break, Nick demonstrated how to turn a pepper grinder

(mill); using a 12-inch piece (3x3) of hard maple, Nick went through each step & completed the grinder. Nick wrote an article for the AAW Journal describing the steps from start to completion -- he has graciously given permission for the Club members to have a copy (note paragraph later on in newsletter).

After a break for show & tell and the raffle, Nick then started on a 14-inch ash plate. He mounted the piece of ash on a screw chuck (which had been previously drilled), and turned the back & bottom for holding in an expansion chuck. Remounting the plate in the expansion chuck, Nick then proceeded to refine (gently) the rim (edge) of the plate. Then went on to turn the rim. After refining the rim, it was time to get the torch out & burn the rim. Recommending that it be done slowly & make sure that your bed/floor (area) is cleared of shavings! We want no fire department to be called! With a cup of water, and a Scotch Brite pad handy, Nick started to burn the rim, going very slowly. After burning, he wet the rim w/the pad & buffed the rim. Then repeated the burning to get the density he wanted. After that was complete, it was now time to turn the inside of the plate. First was to start turning next to the rim, undercutting the rim slightly. He made the recommendation --NOT to turn out the plate from the center, as you would normally do. By doing it the normal way, this would eliminate the bulk, but would also provide plenty of vibration. So by keeping the 'mass' in the bottom, Nick proceeded to undercut the rim by only turning away what wood was needed in order to accomplish that task. When the rim undercut was finished to his satisfaction,

Nick then proceeded to turn away the rest of the mass in the center of the bowl. Doug




Segmented turnings --Please attend this meeting, so I can show you how easy it is. "Segmented turning" is the art of converting a flat board into a round object". Demo will cover all of the basics that are required for this conversion. It will be directed basically to the beginner and intermediate turner, but with a few tips and ideas that may add to the skilled turner's knowledge. Bill

He started with a bowl that had no shape, and covered the difference between a typical beginning bowl with no form. John then proceeded to change the shape to illustrate the subtle differences in a good form versus a poorly shaped one. He discussed the size of the base in regards to the 'end' usage meaning a small base (if bowl is to be decorative) or a substantial base (if bowl is to be functional).

John then talked about the style/form for hollow vessels, by illustrating how he proceeds to shape a maple vessel. The piece was originally mounted between centers for the initial outside shaping. He showed how he cut a tenon on the base, and talked about how the base was shaped for maximum holding in the chuck. Mounting the piece into the chuck,

Alan says he can find at least six names for the same tool: spindle gouge, detail gouge, ladyfinger gouge, shallow gouge, fingernail gouge, coving gouge & probably more. What is a roughing gouge to look like? Then there's sizes -- 1/2" bowl gouge - 1/2 inch; but measured how? Across the flute or one that measures the size of the rod used. Difference being the English version versus the US

version (US being the side of the bar, and English being the size of the flute).





type of turning since "1994"!

For ease of directions -- included in this newsletter - is a copy of inside/outside turning from a Jan. '91 Wood magazine.

While it looks complicated, it might be worth trying just two pieces of 2x2 in boards glued together. These two boards are glued together w/regular wood glue w/piece of paper in-between. (allow to dry overnight) The paper allows easy separation when finished turning the design. To insure the two pieces do not come apart, use regular package strapping tape at each end (several times around). (turn in-between the tape; if you turn the tape off, there would be no sense in using tape in the first place!) Further security is using a small diameter disc & screwing it into the two pieces of 2x2 (both ends).

As for me, I need to think about options now that I have the good news that the disease can be arrested simply by avoiding inhalation of aluminum oxide. 

Rev. Ellis Willard Baxter, Jr. Gainesville, GA

Reverend Ellis Willard Baxter, Jr., age 71 of 3738 Anglin Drive, Gainesville, GA 30507 passed away at home Monday June 28, 2004. Mr. Baxter was the son of the late Ellis Willard Baxter Sr., and Thelma Stevens Baxter. Funeral services will be held 11:00 a.m. Thursday July 1, 2004 at Lakewood Baptist Church with burial to follow in Memorial Park Cemetery. Dr. Tom Smiley, Sheriff Steve Cronic, Rev. Bob Baxter and Rev. Don Ormsbee will officiate. The family will receive friends on Wednesday June 30, 2004 from 2-4 and 7-9 pm at the Memorial Park Funeral Home, Gainesville, GA. Rev. Baxter was born in Harralson County, Georgia but made his home in Hall County. Mr. Baxter was ordained a Baptist Minister at the age of 19. Rev. Baxter graduated from Mercer University, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, North Carolina Baptist Hospital School of Pastoral Care, and was Assistant Administrator at the Georgia Baptist Children's Home. 

THE PROJECTS OF GEORGE HATFIELD



George completed 2 projects for us at the last guild meeting. You missed a real treat if you missed this one.! His work is very thoroughly planned out ahead of time He plans what he is going to do, then does what he has planned. He develops patterns for the project and uses them as he progresses through the project so that this plus superb-tool work results in identical items time after time.

None of the typical "design opportunities" that most of us have for George.

The first project was a round picture frame. Made of poplar he added embellishments that he otherwise would have left out if the wood had had more character. He started with a 12:" X 2" disk attached by screw chuck to the lathe and proceeded to turn the back of the frame, turning recesses for the glass and photo and a larger recess for the backing board which was to be of 3/16" MDF. The outer edge of each rabbet was recessed a little deeper than the inner so that the glass and backer would rest firmly where it would be seen from the front. He then opened the center opening part way so that he could finish the inner frame edge to avoid break out when he cut through from the front. He then sanded and finished the back completely. He noted at this time that he considers this furniture and thus need to be sanded only to 220 or 240 grit.

George then reversed the turning and using the outer recess on the back mounted it to MDF fixture attached to Cole jaws chuck, expanding into the recess. I suspect that a face plate and press fit disk could also be used for this if you took care when cutting the outer recess to fit it to the disk and then used the tail stock for support until removing the center piece when turning the front. In turning the front he removed the center first by making a double parting cut until almost through, then stopping the lathe and using a skew, point down in the cut, finished cutting through by rotating the piece by hand. He then proceeded to turn and finish the front, thinning the edge near the glass to 1/8" thick.

He then turned the backing board to fit the back recess. This is all more fully explained in the Spring 2004 issue of the AAW journal.

His second project was a lidded box with fancy top and pedestal bottom. He first turned a cylinder, parted it two and proceeded to hollow each half, sand and finish, again using templates or patterns, then reassembling the two halves he fixed the bottom end in a chuck and brought up the tail stock to the top end and turned the rounded outside section of the box and the upper finial, then sanded and finished same. A good

push fit to the bottom allowed him removes the tailstock and sand the end of the finial. He then removed the top, sanded away enough material from the bottom fit recess to provide a pop fit for the top rather than a push fit, it having served its purpose. He then turned and finished the bottom half. When parting off the base he doubled up on the parting cut to provide a wide enough slot to use the skew, toe down, to clean up and under cut the base. I suspect that you or I might do better using a spindle or detail gouge for this.

Using precise patterns and templates along with calipers allowed George to turn the inside and then the outside with no fear of cutting through and ending up with a 1/8" wall thickness on this piece. It sure made the hollowing smooth and easy to cut and the outside fit was prefect. If you want to sell a lot of stuff or make a lot of presents for folks this is the way to go!!

They turn 16" over the Steel Bed, and include the basic machine with 2 HP, variable speed 230V motor, drive center live center, 4" face plate, 12" tool rest and base, knockout bar, wrenches and instruction manual. They turn 42" between centers, have a 1 ½" x 8 tpi spindle and weigh 386 lbs.




Michael is a self-employed woodworker producing a variety of original designs including sculptural containers, commissioned furniture, architectural elements, and speculative works for exhibition. Technical services include contract woodturning, custom furniture, architectural

Michael has been an instructor at the Santa Fe Community College Fine Woodworking Program since 1997.







President's Message - I want to thank everyone who attended the last meeting, with Dave Barriger demonstrating. We had 32 members in attendance with two visitors. Dave is a retired botany professor & knows his trees quite well. In the past, Dave has given talks on tree structure, etc., and how to predict movements and working characteristics of wood.

Dave started his demonstration by turning a plain (up and down) bowl, poorly shaped, etc. He then discussed the "ABC's" of natural bowls, and the "DEFG's". Dave discussed the (A) angle and cut of the shape, the (B)bark - which types of bark are more pleasing and show well; the (C)color of wood; (D)diameter in relation to shape of the piece to be turned; (E)extras - meaning bark inclusions, ripple, curl, etc.; (F) figure - crotch, burl, etc.; and (G)grain of the wood. He then reated the members to a slide how of his work, explaining each urned piece - what type of wood, grain, shape, etc.

Dave started the afternoon session by explaining what to look for when deciding to turn a root. Tap roots are not suitable. The proper branching and how to visualize what form is possible. Dave then started to shape the piece and flared the top out to take full advantage of the root system. He then hollowed the piece. Dave passed around examples of a crab wood root. He then showed how he sanded the piece by using a sander in stationary mode, which allowed him to roll the edges if he chose to.

Dave is going to finish the piece and send it back for the raffle at a later date. Doug




